Embouchure Part 1

To find out what the proper embouchure should be like, try the following:

- 1. Put your thumb in your mouth about 3/4" (2 cm) with the pad of the thumb touching your top teeth just as the mouthpiece does. <u>DON'T BITE!</u>
- 2. Fold about 1/2 of your bottom lip over your lower teeth.
- 3. Suck you thumb.
- 4. Notice that the chin is flat, the cheeks are not puffed, and the lips are drawn around the thumb in a circular pattern.
- 5. For sax, you simply blow instead of suck.

If you have access to a keyboard or a <u>properly tuned</u> piano, try the following with the <u>mouthpiece alone</u>.

- 1. Properly attach the reed to the mouthpiece using the ligature.
- 2. If you play alto sax:
 - ♦ Play A one octave and 6 steps above the middle C on the keyboard.

If you play tenor sax:

- lacktriangle Play G one octave and 5 steps above the middle C on the keyboard.
- 3. Match this pitch with the mouthpiece alone.
- 4. Get a good strong tone with lots of air.
- 5. Do this at the beginning of you practice session for 5 minutes.
- 6. Then put the mouthpiece back on the sax, and play with the same embouchure tension.
